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## Death can be dignified without suicide

Nive states now allow terminally ill, mentally competent patients to end their lives through physician-assisted

Advocates say that giving patients freedom to choose their end-of-life-care allows them death with dignity."

I've been thinking a lot about assisted suicide since 29-yearold Brittany Maynard publicly announced her decision to end her life. The California newlywed had been diagnosed with an aggressive form of brain cancer; doctors told her she likely had six months to live.

"After months of research, my family and I reached a heartbreaking conclusion: There is no treatment that would save my life, and the recommended treatments would have destroyed the time I had left," she wrote.

"Because the rest of my body is young and healthy, I am likely to physically hang on for a long time even though cancer is eating my mind. I probably would have suffered in hospice care for weeks or even months. And my family would have had to watch that."

Maynard and her family moved to Oregon, where physician-assisted suicide is legal.

When she killed herself with a cocktail of prescribed medications, Maynard wrote on Face-


## HOLIDAY WISH LIST
