# UberX-pansion?

## Rideshare service to offer travel options, though not without a fight

Harrisburg cab companies oppose UberX, but cab drivers have been 'praying' for its arrival.

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> HARRISBURG • The ridesharing service UberX is coming to Harrisburg. And for cab drivers here, it can't come soon enough.

> But Pennsylvania cab companies are preparing to fight the advance of rideshare companies. Last week, the state's Public

> Utility Commission voted 4-1 to provide the cellphone app-based service with an experimental li-cense for two years. That license does not cover Philadelphia and several counties in the state, but it would set the groundwork for Uber's expansion into Harrisburg and nearby communities.

> "We've been waiting a long time," said one cab driver parked outside the train station downtown. "We've been praying for this."

> The driver didn't want his name published because he still works for Capital Cab Co. But he

### IS IT A CAR OR A CAB?

### What is Uber?

Founded in 2009, Uber is a rideshare service that uses downloaded apps and smartphone GPS to match passengers with nearby company-provided drivers.

## What is UberX?

The San Francisco-based company offers several vehicle options for people to share their rides. UberX, the cheapest and most basic option, uses everyday cars for transporting people. UberBlack uses highend sedans with private drivers, UberTaxi uses taxi vehicles, UberSUV uses vehicles that fit up to six people and UberLux uses luxury vehicles.

## How do you use Uber?

Those interested in using Uber's service must first download their app. Once downloaded, you will be required to enter credit or debit card information. After that, you can use your smartphone to request

## **AG: Secrecy** rules were not broken

Kane, who hired crisis manager Lanny Davis, says she's being targeted because of her effort to end abuses in the justice system.

Attorney General Kathleen Kane testified for more than two hours Monday before a grand jury investigating whether her office violated grand jury secrecy requirements, after saying she would tell the panel that information was shared but no law was broken.

In a statement she read before entering her eastern regional office to testify, Kane suggested she was being targeted because of her effort to end abuses of the criminal justice system, but she did not specify by whom. "If this can be done to me as INSIDE

attorney general ... I am sickened to think what can be done and may be done to regular, good people who don't have the resources that I have to challenge it," Kane said. Kane's attorney, Gerald Shar-

gel, said the attorney general gave a truthful account in her testimony and has done nothing

## Task force unveils plan to fight abuse

The committee's 'blueprint' made 130 recommendations in battling the growing issue of elderly mistreatment.

Abuse of senior citizens, both physical and financial, has become a growing problem in Pennsylvania, and it isn't expected to abate as the state's elderly population rises.

Courts across the state are regularly handling cases where people 60 or older have been mistreated or neglected, or have had their finances drained by con men or others, often loved ones, who were supposed to be looking out for their best interests.

To help combat the ever-increasing scourge, a committee tasked by the state Supreme Court unveiled 130 recommendations Monday that call for everyone from judges to legislators to family members and the general public to get involved.

Key suggestions from the elder law task force, which would require action by the Legislature, include mandating training and criminal background checks for those who would be guardians of the elderly. Enactment of laws to re-

quire banks and other financial institutions to report

## **FIXING THE PROBLEM**

Among the recommendations by the elder law task force are the following:

» Mandating training and criminal background checks for potential guardians of the elderly.

» Creating a fund to pay for guardianship services for those with limited resources.

» Increasing state funding to the Supreme Court.

» Sending lottery funds to elder justice programs.
