

Amanda Danuski, 34, doesn't let a rare bone condition get in the way of her life — or job search.

manda Danuski doesn't make excuses or complain about the pain that grips the fragile bones of her 3-foot-tall frame.

Instead, the 34-year-old Dover Township woman smiles from behind the partition at HACC's York campus Welcome Center, answering phones, assisting students and processing college applications while using a wheelchair to get around.

It's blatant that she cherishes the job, one she found after an 8-month battle with unemployment that began in March. That month, Danuski left a nine-year career at Top Flight Corp. to join her sister in starting a business — one that quickly succumbed to the sour economy.

Without work, Danuski applied for any job she could find, using Facebook to post inquiries for leads. In October, she found a link to a HACC job ad in her inbox, courtesy of an online friend.

From there, everything fell into place.

"With the disability factor, usually it's harder," she said. "I've heard it's harder to get a job. I personally have not experienced that.'

Osteneogenesis imperfecta?

Osteneogenesis imperfecta is a genetic disorder that causes bones to break easily sometimes for no known reason. It also can cause weak muscles, brittle teeth, a curved spine and hearing loss.

This condition affects an estimated six to seven people in 100,000 worldwide.

At birth, doctors said she wouldn't

live beyond one week. Since then, she has endured about 100 broken bones.

When her parents told her she would never drive a car, Danuski, then 17, contacted the Pennsylvania Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, which outfitted her minivan with a ramp and raised gas and brake pedals.

Today, she owns her own house and often forgets she has a disability.

"I'm thankful for the job and the way my parents raised me to work hard for what you want. Don't let anything stand in your way," she said. "Excuses get you nowhere.'

New jobless claims down

WASHINGTON — New dropped iobless claims sharply last week to a stillhigh 410,000 as the effect of Superstorm Sandy probably

The figure for the week ending Nov. 17 was down 41,000 from the previous week's revised figure of 451,000. But the 410,000 new claims, which was in line with analyst expectations, job market improved.

Consumer confidence holds at 5-year high

The final November index showing consumer sentiment stood at 82.7.

WASHINGTON — Consumer confidence held at a five-year high in November, but there were signs that concerns about the "fiscal cliff" are starting to weigh on senti-

The final November index of consumer sentiment stood at 82.7 based on the widely followed survey by Thomson Reuters/ University of Michigan.

That's a notch above the 82.6 reading for October, but down from the 84.9 preliminary index earlier in November.

Details of the report released Wednesday showed consumers' mood about current conditions brightened in November, most likely reflecting the improving housing market and gains in job growth in October.

But consumers were less upbeat about expectations for the future, signaling greater awareness and caution about a fiscal cliff of higher taxes and federal spending cuts at the start of next year, unless lawmakers take action to avert what most analysts believe will lead the nation into recession.

The latest report comes just two days before the traditional start of the holiday shopping season.

Surveys suggest that the Christmas retail season will likely match last year's performance, but sales could disappoint if consumers become increasingly nervous that the nation could go over the fiscal cliff.
