Halloween has arrived early in the Tri-State with area hauntings a-plenty

HUNTINGTON — Fall's calendar has made that creaky turn of the crank into October, and that means the ghouls are restless.

And some souls just can't wait around for the last two weekends of October to enjoy a good haunting.

Here's a look at some early spaces to feel the cold, icy breath of ghouls, goblins and lost souls.

Trains and zombies and spiders, oh my!

Camden Park, West Virginia's only amusement park, is now open 6 to 11 p.m. every Friday and Saturday for its 11th annual Spooktacular.

There are more than 20 rides and attractions. One is the park's specially tricked-out historic haunted house ride, the Haunted Train Ride. It must travel through a cemetery full of zombies before it makes its way back into the station. The park has lots of chills and thrills including a haunted maze and rides like the Spider and Big Dipper.

Admission to Spooktacular is \$18 for ages 3 and older. Children under 3 are admitted for free. The park distributed coupons for free children's admission to area schools as well as coupons available on the park's Web site at www.camdenpark.com.

Crazy Granny loose again

The heck with blowing out 100 candles and sitting around at the old folks home. There's a crazy granny loose and haunting the fields near the Valley Fire Department on Route 2.

The Crazy Granny is just one of the main attractions to the fire department's fourth annual Field of Screams that runs dark to midnight every Friday and Saturday in October.

Popcorn and drinks will be available; admission is \$5 for ages 6 and up. Five and under get in free.

The Haunted Tunnel

Next weekend, there'll be screams a plenty coming from Ohio 93 in Ironton, and it won't just be those people who insanely tried the BW3's "Blazin'" wings.

The Friday night lights get turned on Oct. 9 for one of the area's most unique haunted attractions, the Haunted Tunnel.

Put on by the Ironton Lion's Club, the Haunted Tunnel will now run 7 to 11 p.m. nightly Oct. 9-10, Oct. 16-17, 23-24 and Oct. 30-31.

The tunnel is located at the intersection of U.S. 52 and State Route 93 in Ironton, directly across from the Ironton Hills Shopping Center.

Admission is \$5. All proceeds go to the civic organization's community projects which include sponsoring seeing eye dogs and glasses to those who are sight impaired, providing scholarships, donating to area food banks and much more.

Old Halloween trinkets haunt collectors shelves during holiday

enthusiast. Jack-o'-lanterns head the list. It is interesting to note that the first jack-o'-lanterns were made from turnips in Ireland. When the Irish came to America they adapted their jack-o'-lanterns to pumpkins.

The innovative Americans made the ever-popular lanterns out of paper. The Germans went one better and made their early jack-o'-lan-

terns out of a plaster-of-paris type of material that can sell for thousands of dollars today. These became permanent decorations to be preserved, passed along and finally collected.

Halloween demands great noisemakers. One that comes to mind is the clicker. These small metal toys shaped like owls must have driven parents to distraction. Click-click, click-click over and over again. It is a wonder any of them survived for the serious collector today, but if you have one, it is a treasure to those who love this venue.

Halloween memorabilia such as masks, costumes and

party goods have become a serious collectible, and some of it is valuable. One authority, Mark B. Ledenbach, has not only written a book "Vintage Halloween Collectibles" but has a great Web site that can help guide a person as to what to collect and value of those macabre goods.

The site is www.halloween-collector.com/. There are other Web sites a person might want to investigate, but this one is exceptionally well done and informative.

Locally, many of the Old Central City antique merchants on 14th Street West in Huntington have some fine examples of Halloween memorabilia.

Lee Ditty for one, already has her black cat collection guarding her shop window. Before long other dealers will be trotting out their black and orange to entertain the shoppers during these fall days.

With so many shops in one location a person can pretty much be guaranteed a great find for their Halloween collection.
